Awards Criteria

Volunteers often ask what the criteria is to receive various awards. Below is an outline of the criteria used to determine award winners.

Green Bandanna – One year with 20 or more visits and/or other service

Pins – awarded at increments of 100 visits.

Special Awards -based on a combination of visits and other contributions.

Hall of Fame awarded after retirement or posthumously. All visits during the fiscal year are counted, including special events.

JULY 21 Meeting Canine Dental Care

Dr. Chris Visser of Arizona Veterinary Dental Specialists gave an interesting and educational presentation. From his work with the Phoenix Zoo to his private practice Dr. Visser is truly a wealth of knowledge. Here are a few highlights:

All pets no matter their age, should get their teeth and mouth **examined** by a professional **once a year**. He also recommended x-rays be done routinely (just like humans). Many dental problems can be prevented with early detection, and the best way is through x-rays because most dental diseases begin below the gum line.

It is equally important to **check the condition of** the teeth beyond tartar and plaque – breakage for instance. When pets are strong chewers, they can crack the tips off of their molars. These molars can often be saved with a bonding procedure, if this is discovered before too much erosion and/or decay has occurred. Dr. Visser mentioned that no dog should chew any 'chew' that does not have some pliability to it.

Another interesting fact was **dogs and cats should not have bad breath**. Being a 'senior' pet is not an excuse for bad breath. Bad breath is a sign that there is something wrong going on in the pet's mouth and should be addressed by a veterinarian. Just as in human medicine, there are specialists in veterinary medicine. Sometimes it is necessary to consult a specialist and reputable veterinarians will make such recommendations.

Many things can be done to take preventive measures to ensure a healthy mouth in our pets from healthy chews, to toothpaste and brushing, dog dental diets, gels and rinses. Walk for a Dog Support Pets on Wheels

We hope that you are using the Walk for a Dog app on your Android or I-phone.

The app is easy to use and tracks (on your cell phone) the distance, time, and average MPH for every walk you take. Don't have a dog?? You can still use the app to track your personal walking. Since POW volunteers began using the app in early summer, we have walked **696 times** for a total of



688 miles. We expect that POW will soon receive the first donation from Walk for a Dog. The donation is based on the number of walks from our volunteers who are using the app.

Health Certificates

Many facilities are requiring a copy of an-up-to date pet health certificate. Some are keeping close track of the dates and will not allow teams to visit under expired paperwork. Some also require a flu shot and a TB test. It is the volunteer's responsibility to keep this paperwork up to date at their facility. Elaine always sends ample warning, before the pet certificate expires. Blank forms can be printed from our website. Please make sure you are qualified to continue visiting. Keep your pet health certificate up to date.

5 Halloween Safety Tips for Pets

Halloween can be a festive and fun time for children and families. But for pets? Let's face it, it can be a downright nightmare. Forgo the stress and dangers this year by following these 10 easy tips.

1. Trick-or-treat candies are not for pets.

All forms of chocolate -- especially baking or dark chocolate -- can be dangerous, even lethal, for dogs and cats. Symptoms of **chocolate poisoning** may include vomiting, diarrhea, rapid breathing, increased heart rate, and seizures. Halloween candies containing the artificial sweetener **xylitol** can also be poisonous to dogs. Even small amounts of **xylitol** can cause a sudden drop in blood sugar and subsequent loss of coordination and seizures. And while **xylitol** toxicity in cats has yet to be established, it's better to be safe than sorry.

2. Keep pets confined and away from the door.

Not only will your door be constantly opening and closing on Halloween, but strangers will be dressed in unusual costumes and yelling loudly for their candy. This, of course, is scary for our furry friends. Dogs are especially territorial and may become anxious and growl at innocent trick-or-treaters. Putting your dog or cat in a secure room away from

the front door will also prevent them from darting outside into the night ... a night when no one wants to be searching for a lost loved one.

3. Don't dress your pet in a costume unless you know they'll love it.

If you do decide that Fido or Kitty needs a costume, make sure it isn't annoying or unsafe. It should not constrict movement, hearing, or the ability to breathe or bark and meow.

4. Try on pet costumes before the big night.

If they seem distressed, allergic, or show abnormal behavior, consider letting them go in their "birthday suit". Festive bandanas usually work for party poopers, too.

5. IDs, please!

If your dog or cat should escape and become lost, having the proper identification will increase the chances that they will be returned. Just make sure the information is up-to-date, even if your pet has a microchip.


